# Course Details

## Units of Credit 6

### Summary of the Course

If you are interested in learning the most commonly spoken first language in Europe and have no prior knowledge of the German language, then *Introductory German A* is the right course for you. Based on a communicative and task-based approach, this course is designed to help you quickly develop your proficiency in basic oral and written German. Vocabulary and basic German grammar are presented in contexts that are relevant for everyday language use. If you are a first-time language learner, we will equip you with basic language learning strategies to make your learning process more effective. The course introduces you to important facets of German societies and culture and, in this way, give you a better understanding of life in German-speaking countries.

This course is a beginners-level language course. All students who have had some experience with the language, either as a heritage language or through previous instruction, must fill in the placement questionnaire available at <https://hal.arts.unsw.edu.au/students/courses/language-placements>. You will not be permitted to enrol in a language course that is too easy for you. If this occurs, you will be requested to change your enrolment.

### Course Learning Outcomes

1. Use a very basic range of vocabulary and phrases in German and apply a few simple rules of grammar.
2. Understand and use the German language in short interactions in familiar everyday situations.
3. Use very basic strategies to maintain communication.
4. Identify some features of linguistic and cultural diversity, including the varied nature of the German-speaking world.
5. Reflect on learning process and learning strategies.

### Teaching Strategies

The teaching strategies of our German classes are based on the communicative and task-based approach, which aim at giving students opportunities to practice their communication skills in contexts that are personally relevant and connected to everyday life. Thus, students learn a very authentic use of the German language combined with cultural and historical knowledge. The learning material (print and digital) and learning activities (e.g. online tasks, small tasks/projects inside and outside the classroom, short fictional and non-fictional texts) provide students with varied opportunities to practice their receptive and productive skills, as well as their vocabulary and basic German grammar. We encourage students to use suitable language learning strategies, and to independently practice or revise their German skills on a regular basis, inside and beyond the classroom. The language of instruction is predominantly German (apart from some explanation of grammatical features) so that students develop their listening skills. In both lecture and tutorials, we are using different learning approaches and modes of instruction (presentations, pair or small group work, individual assignments) to provide extensive and more holistic opportunities to listen to, read, speak and write in German.

### Assessment 1: Portfolio

Portfolio consists of two parts which are submitted on the LMS over the course of the term. Each part will require approximately 120 minutes work, including short-answer, multiple choice and open-ended questions, short writing tasks and reflection on students' learning needs and progress.

## Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

### UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

**Copying:** Using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This includes copying materials, ideas or concepts from a book, article, report or other written document, presentation, composition, artwork, design, drawing, circuitry, computer program or software, website, internet, other electronic resource, or another person's assignment without appropriate acknowledgement.

**Inappropriate paraphrasing:** Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original information, structure and/or progression of ideas of the original without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

**Collusion:** Working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student for the purpose of them plagiarising, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

**Inappropriate citation:** Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

**Duplication ("self-plagiarism"):** Submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

### Correct referencing practices
