Summary of the Course

Subject area: *Spanish and Latin American Studies*

Spanish is the language of over four hundred million people. It is spoken officially in 23 countries and it is the second language of the United States, where there are some 45 million Spanish speakers. Spanish is also one of the four major languages of the European Union alongside English, French and German.

If you are interested in learning one of the most commonly spoken first languages in the world and have some prior knowledge of the Spanish language, then Introductory Spanish B is the right course for you. Based on a communicative and culture-based approach, this course is designed to help you quickly develop your proficiency in basic oral and written Spanish. Vocabulary and basic Spanish grammar are presented in contexts that are relevant for everyday language use. You will also learn basic language learning strategies to make your learning process more effective. The course introduces you to some facets of Hispanic societies and culture and, in this way, gives you a better understanding of life in Hispanic-speaking countries and also a basic insight into the culture of the Spanish speaking world. We are the first and only university in Australia using the innovative Online Coaching program which offers you a unique opportunity to work outside of class with a personal, native-speaker language coach located in a Spanish Speaking country in a real-time, online learning environment. We hope that this unique personal experience will be truly enjoyable and will motivate you to continue learning Spanish.

At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to

1. Understand and use with confidence frequently used expressions which are related to areas of most immediate relevance.
2. Communicate effectively in everyday tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information.
3. Describe in Spanish aspects of personal background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.
4. Demonstrate a basic understanding of some linguistic and cultural diversity including the varied nature of the Hispanic world.

Teaching Strategies

This course is designed for students who have some previous knowledge of the language. The course seeks to create an inclusive environment where students have opportunities to explore the target language. This course introduces students to online resources from which they can explore Spanish language and culture, and from which they receive constructive and continuous feedback.

The materials selected for this course provide a diversity of activities to assist students with different learning needs and linguistic capabilities. This is a "blended learning" course which contains a large out of class learning component, namely your weekly on-line live coaching sessions with tutors in a Spanish speaking country and your weekly activities,. In addition to this a range of other teaching modalities are included (in-class small and large group discussions, task-oriented activities in pairs and groups and live coaching).

You will be engaging in:

- Speaking activities
- Grammar activities
- Writing activities
- Reading comprehension activities related to the themes studied
- Audio-visual comprehension activities

Assessment 2: Oral test

Details: A short oral test comprising a 5 minute conversation with your tutor on topics covered this session. This test will be recorded. Feedback via marks only.

Tutorial activities (on-going) and a short oral test in week 13.

Your final mark will reflect the quality of your performance in completing tutorial activities (weekly oral activities) + your performance in a short oral test.

Assessment 3: On-line coaching sessions

Start date: Week 4 to week 9 x 6 sessions

Length: 30 minutes x 6 sessions compulsory

Details: Oral component (30 min per 8 sessions). Your mark will reflect your preparedness for the class and active participation in a range of activities. The convenor marks your work based on the recordings of your sessions and weekly reports from coaches. Feedback: individual comments and marks

Additional details:

A substantial oral component (30 min per week/6 compulsory sessions). Your mark will reflect your regular attendance, preparedness for the class, and active participation in a range of activities. **Coaches do not mark your oral performance.** The convenor marks your work based on the recordings of your sessions and weekly reports from coaches. See **On-line coaching** on Moodle for further information.

Assessment 4: Test x 3

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: varies

Details: Comprehensive assessments which are based on all aspects of Spanish studied in the course. The format used in these tests is: a grammatical on-line component /Quiz("fill in the blanks" and "multiple choice") and a short 80-100 word composition in Spanish on topics practiced in the class. Individual feedback and rubric. Test 3 (20%) is the final assessment for attendance purposes.

Additional details:

3 Tests. 20% each, total weight 60%

This is a comprehensive assessment which is based on all aspects of Spanish studied in the lectures, tutorials and on-line coaching. Each test consists of the following 5 segments: **Así se dice** (vocabulary), **Así se forma** (grammar), **Para escuchar or Para leer** (Listening or reading comprehension), **Para escribir** (writing), and **Cultura**. To prepare for these tests complete **Self-tests** you will find on this site under relevant week, as well as **Quizzes** you will find on Moodle under relevant week. Quizzes are compulsory (graded/part of your homework). Self-tests and Quizzes prepare you for your **Tests** and give you an **immediate feedback** on your Spanish skills. **The format** used in these tests is: a **grammatical on-line component /Quiz**("fill in the blanks" and "multiple choice"). **Para escribir component** (a short 125 - 150 word composition in Spanish on topics practiced in the class). Done in the lab during tutorial time, see Moodle for details.

Submission of Assessment Tasks

Students are expected to put their names and student numbers on every page of their assignments.

If you are unable to submit your assignment due to a fault with Turnitin you may apply for an extension, but you must retain your ticket number from External Support (along with any other relevant documents) to include as evidence to support your extension application. If you email External Support you will automatically receive a ticket number, but if you telephone you will need to specifically ask for one. Turnitin also provides updates on their system status on Twitter.

Generally, assessment tasks must be submitted electronically via either Turnitin or a Moodle assignment. In instances where this is not possible, it will be stated on your course's Moodle site with alternative submission details.

Late Assessment Penalties

Students are responsible for the submission of assessment tasks by the required dates and times. Depending on the extent of delay in the submission of an assessment task past the due date and time, one of the following late penalties will apply unless special consideration or a blanket extension due to a technical outage is granted. For the purpose of late penalty calculation, a 'day' is deemed to be each 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline for submission.

- **Work submitted less than 10 days after the stipulated deadline** is subject to a deduction of 5% of the total awardable mark from the mark that would have been achieved if not for the penalty for every day past the stipulated deadline for submission. That is, a student who submits an assignment with a stipulated deadline of 4:00pm on 13 May 2016 at 4:10pm on 14 May 2016 will incur a deduction of 10%.

Task with a non-percentage mark

If the task is marked out of 25, then late submission will attract a penalty of a deduction of 1.25 from the mark awarded to the student for every 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline.

Example: A student submits an essay 48 hours and 10 minutes after the stipulated deadline. The total possible mark for the essay is 25. The essay receives a mark of 17. The student's mark is therefore $17 - [25 (0.05 \times 3)] = 13.25$

Task with a percentage mark

If the task is marked out of 100%, then late submission will attract a penalty of a deduction of 5% from the mark awarded to the student for every 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline.

Example: A student submits an essay 48 hours and 10 minutes after the stipulated deadline. The essay is marked out of 100%. The essay receives a mark of 68. The student's mark is therefore $68 - 15 = 53$

- **Work submitted 10 to 19 days after the stipulated deadline** will be assessed and feedback provided but a mark of zero will be recorded. If the work would have received a pass mark but for the lateness and the work is a compulsory course component (hurdle requirement), a student will be deemed to have met that requirement;
- **Work submitted 20 or more days after the stipulated deadline** will not be accepted for assessment and will receive no feedback, mark or grade. If the assessment task is a compulsory component of the course a student will receive an Unsatisfactory Fail (UF) grade as a result of unsatisfactory performance in an essential component of the course.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit. It also applies to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without referencing and a student's own analysis to bring the material together.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre (<http://www.lc.unsw.edu.au/>). Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.
