Summary of the Course

This course develops observational, critical, and analytical tools for application to research in the creative arts. It begins with a focus on art and artists; understanding the materials and processes of creative practice in historical, disciplinary and aesthetic contexts. An understanding of the role of research, theory, and criticism within the arts is developed, alongside ethical processes for undertaking such work. You will be introduced to media-specific and trans-disciplinary forms of compositional analysis, with specific attention to the practices and processes of the artist. Beyond the terms of the work of art and the role of the artist, analytical and theoretical methods drawing on disciplines within and beyond the arts will be covered and may include empirical, formal, post-structural, phenomenological, material and cultural approaches. There is a focus on Australian content, including indigenous artists, and their place within important international networks

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Recognize and analyze key theories of creativity across a variety of artistic disciplines
- 2. Apply diverse critical lenses to creative work including interpretative, formal, aesthetic, phenomenological, empirical, pedagogical, sociological
- 3. Hone research skills, gathering primary and secondary sources of information about case studies, and critically assessing such resources
- 4. Apply writing skills to the analysis and critique of creative practices and associated discourses

Teaching Strategies

- · Key examples of disciplinary and interdisciplinary creative practice will be discussed, drawn primarily from across the 20th and 21st centuries.
- The course will be team taught with specialists from the various creative disciplines in the School of the Arts and Media; Theatre and Performance Studies, Music, Media, Film, English and Creative Writing.
- A special focus on writing will be developed through writing exercises and text analysis.
- The 2hr seminars will develop the required knowledge and skills through various means: instruction in a content-delivery format, group projects, and individual writing tasks.
- Online learning will supplement the face-to-face contact with pod-cast/lectures and audio-visual case studies.
- Students will be expected to engage in the face-to-face contact time through observation, discussion and debate.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre (http://www.lc.unsw.edu.au/). Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.

UNSW Library also has the ELISE tool available to assist you with your study at UNSW. ELISE is designed to introduce new students to studying at UNSW but it can also be a great refresher during your study.
