Summary of the Course

Subject Area: Music

In this elective for the Creative Practice major of the BMus, you will participate in workshops and seminars to design, develop and realise a creative project presented in a public performance/composition event. You will also work with peers specialising in instrumental or vocal performance or composition to present a small group performance project including peer mentoring. In addition, you will engage with innovative models of performance-making employed by world's leading arts practitioners and organisations to present music of past and present.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Formulate sophisticated artistic objectives and realise them in performance
- 2. Articulate complex ideas relevant to the conceptualisation and realisation of a creative project
- 3. Apply advanced collaboration and leadership skill across a variety of performative contexts

Teaching Strategies

In order to develop high level conceptualisation and performance skills required to successfully devise and realise an artistic project in public performance, students will be supported by 36 hours of in-class contact including master classes, workshops and seminars. This will assist in refining individual performance or composition skills, enhance collaborative skills fostered in the Performance Laboratory sequence, forge creativity and originality of thinking, and develop skills in documentation and articulation of complex ideas and concepts.

Assessment 1: Group project

A performance project requiring collaboration with at least one other member of the Music Creative Practice cohort such as a performer/composer collaboration, chamber music and cross-genre collaboration. This will be presented as a performance in class.

Approximately 5 minutes.

The performance will be assessed in class at the time of presentation and feedback will be given then.

Assessment 2: Written Report

Details:

Critical reflection documenting stages of the creative process involved in preparing the performance project for public presentation. The final document should be devised to accompany and enhance the performance event.

Details:

Requires the preparation of a performance project at UNSW or in another approved venue. The performance may either be solo or involve collaborators as necessary.

Additional details:

The timing for this performance is a nominal figure: a programme of 15-20 minutes will be expected, but this will be negotiated with course tutors during the term, and will depend on the nature and substance of the material presented.

Performances are expected to take place during week 10 (beginning 3 August), but this will be confirmed and negotiated during the term.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre (http://www.lc.unsw.edu.au/). Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.

UNSW Library also has the ELISE tool available to assist you with your study at UNSW. ELISE is designed to introduce new students to studying at UNSW but it can also be a great refresher during your study.

Completing the ELISE tutorial and quiz will enable you to:

- analyse topics, plan responses and organise research for academic writing and other assessment tasks
- effectively and efficiently find appropriate information sources and evaluate relevance to your needs
- use and manage information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose
- better manage your time

- understand your rights and responsibilities as a student at UNSW
