Bachelor of Laws (LLB)

The Law Admission Test (LAT) is required for all domestic applicants who wish to study an Undergraduate Law degree at UNSW, except for:

- Indigenous students undertaking the <u>Pre-Law Program</u> at UNSW
- students applying via <u>UNSW Gateway</u>
- International Students (not eligible)

Note: there are 2 codes on UAC:

- Double Law
- B Psychology (Honours)/Bachelor of Laws

Standard registration close: Fri, 11 August

Late registration close*: Wed, 6 September

Test date: September TBC

Kingsford Legal Centre (KLC)

Kingsford Legal Centre takes law out of the classroom.

KLC helps students place law in a broader context with a specific social justice focus.

The Centre is at the forefront of clinical legal education and the community legal centres movement.

- We work toward improving the law, through systemic change and law reform work
