How to prebunk this anticipated myth

Technique-based refutation

Pre-emptive refutation

Highlight the persuasive tactics that the misinformation spreaders are using, such as emotional manipulation or selective framing.

Issue-based refutation

Offer a deeper understanding of a specific issue, making your audience more resistant to false claims. Consider the values held by your target audience when choosing the facts you use to make a persuasive case.
