Hiahliahts

- HERDU, CPHCE has moved to a new office space at Level 1, 18 Marsden St, Camperdown, NSW.
- Two of the directors has stepped down from the executive meeting. Professor Teng Liaw stepped down earlier this year and together with Professor John Hall is retiring at the end of the year. We thank them for their contribution to the Centre for many years.
- We want to thank all the staff, partners and collaborators for working with us during this difficult year. We wish everyone a happy and relax holiday.

Projects

- CPHCE is working as part of a consortium with Swinburne University and the University of Newcastle for the NSW Mental Health Commission on a project on mental
 health literacy. This has involved extensive consultation and codesign work with people with a lived experience of mental health concerns and health care providers to identify
 their needs and priorities for improvement. This has been challenging with much of this having to occur online because of restrictions due to COVID-19. The next phase of the
 project involves working with primary health networks (PHNs), local health districts (LHDs) and other organisations to help them to become more responsive to the health
 literacy needs of people with a lived experience of mental health concerns. This highly innovative project builds on the existing mental health strategies and programs run by
 the PHNs and will roll out over the next 2 years.
- Together with researchers and software engineers of the Australian e-Health Research Centre at CSIRO, PhD student Vera Buss has developed a prototype of a mobile app for people who are at risk of getting diabetes or cardiovascular disease. The app aims to support people aged 45 years and older in changing their behaviours to reduce the risk and prevent the onset of cardiovascular disease and type 2 diabetes mellitus. The next step is to conduct usability testing to improve the app design with the input of users from the target population after that the feasibility study will be conducted.
- A recent research priority identified by the partner organisations for the Central and Eastern Sydney Primary and Community Health Cohort/Resource (CES-P&CH) was
 to examine if increased primary care interventions could minimise potentially preventable hospitalisations (PPH). We used the PPH definition from the Australian 2017
 National Healthcare Agreement which includes admissions to hospital that could have potentially been prevented through the provision of appropriate non-hospital health
 services. This indicator is composed of admissions for 21 conditions, broadly categorized as chronic, acute, and vaccine-preventable. Using CES-P&CH hospital data from
 2005 to 2017 we identified, out of 30,645 CES participants in the cohort, that:
 - $\textbf{1.} \ \ 2,470 \ \text{had at least one preventable chronic hospital admission with the most being for angina} 43\% \ \text{and diabetes complications} 32\% \ \text{and diabetes complications} 32\% \ \text{and diabetes} \ \text{and diabetes}$
 - 3,096 had a preventable acute hospital admission with most being for dehydration/ gastroenteritis 37% and kidney infections 33%
 477 had a vaccine preventable hospitalisation with the majority being related to influenza or pneumonia 86%
 - We are currently examining the circumstances for these PPHs using the primary care data in CES-P&CH to see if they could have been prevented through earlier primary care interventions.
- A new measure that has been developed by the Ministry of Health is the 12-month Risk of Hospitalisation (ROH). The ROH measure is being used to evaluate NSW Health's Planned Care for Better Health initiative. The ROH was calculated using an algorithm which includes:
 - 1. demographics such as age
 - 2. planned and unplanned admissions in the past 4 years
 - 3. chronic conditions such as diabetes, stroke, cancer
 - 4. and other factors such as socioeconomic status and smoking status

We will calculate the ROH for participants in CES using CES-P&CH data either by replicating the algorithm used by the Ministry of Health and/or building similar predictive models. We will then be able to compare the actual and predicted hospitalisations over a 12-month period. See the CES-P&CH webpage which includes information about the resource, as well as previous and current research.

- The Health Equity Stream has been responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes: investigating changes in alcohol related harm, carrying out an equity focussed health impact assessment on the longer term health equity impacts of the pandemic and associated response, providing rapid equity and evidence checks to inform health service response and planning, and investigating the relationship between COVID policy and practice interventions and financial strain in Canada and Australia.
- The OPTIMISE study, which aimed to improve refugee health care in general practice, is now completed. We implemented the study in 3 regions of high refugee settlement across NSW and Victoria. Thirty-one practices undertook, through facilitation process, the OPTIMISE intervention focusing on improving a practice-wide system in identifying refugee status, improving interpreter use, conducting refugee health assessment and referrals to specialised care and other services.
 - As main results are now out, an online NSW state-wide meeting was held on Dec. 3rd, 2020. In the meeting main results were presented: significant increase in conduct of the refugee health assessment, interpreter use and practices with a list of bulk-billing specialists and services; GPs reported reduced difficulties in referring patients to settlement and social services and oral and dental services, but not to mental health services.
 - Feedback from participants included the need for a better linkage between primary health and tertial care, time being a main barrier for GPs to use interpreters and a request for a more service delivery-oriented report. A follow-up meeting with OPTIMISE regional partners will take a place in Dec.16th to discuss further dissemination, policy and service delivery implications of the study results and future research.
