Highlights

- The HERDU team have been assisting the vaccination effort in underserved communities. HERDU Director Fiona Haigh and Miriam Olliek has been helping with planning and operations, Jude Page, Shoko Saito and Miriam Olliek have been out at Pop Up Vaccination clinics in Lakemba, Belmore, Riverwood and Campsie. Shoko Saito has also been conducting injections for the vaccinations and Chris Standen has been helping to link different data sets and develop a whole new rostering system
- Due to the current lockdown restrictions in Sydney, we will be transitioning this year's forum to a Live Stream format. The 2021 CPHCE Annual Forum will be held online on Wednesday 13th October 2021 from 9 am till 12 pm.

Projects

- Bilingual Community Navigators We are currently in the process of discussing with the practice about the time and modality of the pilot intervention. 11 Community Health Workers are recruited, who received 4 hours of induction training, 20 hours of structured online training for Bilingual Community Navigator, and currently attending the periodic workshops with case discussion. Four general practices in Sydney initially agreed to participate in the pilot intervention and we received ethical approval for the pilot intervention where trained BCNs will be placed in the practice to help solve the navigation problems faced by people from culturally and linguistically diverse background suffering from chronic illnesses
- Non-admitted Patient Data now part of CES-P&CH Due to the continued success of the program of work, and the ongoing research and evaluation needs of our partners in relation to access and interaction between primary care, community health care and hospital care, our partners (SLHD, SESLHD and CESPHN) have agreed to continue funding the program of work until June 30, 2024. Because of this we have extended the ethics approval to that date and recently updated the resource with data up to the end of 2020 (new wave of 45 and Up study data, primary care records, prescribing information, emergency department records, cancer registry, hospital records and vital statistics). We also for the first time have been able to link to community health records and outpatient data (from 1 July 2017 to 31 December 2020). We have 3,414,700 NAP records on 148,971 persons in the cohort (about 55.9% of the cohort). We have already begun looking at this data to with regard to management of diabetes and CVD, and exploring way to improve the transition from hospital to the community.
