Projects

• CHECC Study - Community Health Workers extending care into the community

Sharon Parker has been appointed as the trial coordinator and An Tran as Project Officer. The Planned Care Team at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital are in the process of recruiting two Community Health Workers/Navigators who will providing the intervention. After some delay, the trial is aiming to begin patient recruitment in early October.

• Clozapine Shared e-Care Plans (Funded through the Mindgardens Neuroscience Network)

We are currently recruiting consumers and their usual GPs. A shared electronic care plan is being used to share the tasks and responsibilities and support communication between the Euroa Clinic and GPs. Consumers and other agreed care team members can access the care plan.

• Cancer shared e-care plans for breast and colorectal cancers follow-up (Funded by the Avant Foundation)

This study is a quasi-experimental study comparing patients in the intervention with patients in usual follow-up care and is being run through the South Eastern Sydney Cancer Services at St George and Prince of Wales Hospitals. We are currently recruiting patients who have completed active treatment for breast or colorectal cancers and have a usual GP. • CPHCE Advisory Group

We presented some of our work to the CPHCE Advisory Group, chaired by Dr Greg Stewart, on our role in the NSW COVID-19 response, and in Sydney Local Health District, our International insights about the fine line Chief Health Officers play between evidence and politics, the effect of COVID-19 and on financial strain and approaches to mitigation of long COVID-19. We reflected on the ability of Universities to pivot rapidly to respond to the pandemic by providing logistical support and also rapid evidence on how to deal with specific issues such as responses to vaccinations. We had discussions about how fine mapping of COVID-19 clusters against public housing assisted Sydney Local Health District in planning the placement of pop-up vaccination centres, home visits and clinics and the key role rapid Equity Focused Health Impact Assessments informed local responses. We also presented on the underappreciated role smoking and vaping plays on lower respiratory tract infections, especially among disadvantaged groups, and cost effective data driven methods of understanding and monitoring these.

Esther (she/her) started working at CPHCE at the end of 2021 and has joined HERDU as the Health Equity Research Associate in August 2022. As a qualitative social researcher, she has had experience assisting on many university and government funded projects working towards social inclusion and justice since 2012. Her PhD research completed in 2020 contributed a participant-led understanding of how communities with diverse identities and significant differences in economic and social resources can engage in collective action. At HERDU, she loves corridor chats about qualitative methods, critical realism or theories of intersectionality. With the HERDU team, she will continue to conduct research focusing on people's trajectories through healthcare, responses to inequities and social determinants of health, and the relationships between place and health & wellbeing.
