We work as multidisciplinary teams that draw on each individual's area of expertise to inform our research and are committed to contributing to effective policy and practice by working in partnership with community, government and research partners.

The Centres also foster the talents of the next generation of social science researchers through support for early career researchers and our postgraduate research program.

We receive funding from a range of sources, including Australian and state and territory government departments, international funding agencies, research councils such as the Australian Research Council, competitive funding bodies, and a number of non-government and other partner organisations in Australia and abroad.

Since its establishment in 1990 as the National Centre in HIV Social Research, the scope of our research program has evolved to influence and respond to a broad range of national and international health strategies and priorities, with the ultimate aim of improving the health and wellbeing of affected individuals and communities.

Our work is guided by the CSRH Strategic Plan 2016-2019. A primary driver for our work continues to be the Australian Government's five national stategies for blood-borne viruses and sexually transmissible infections (2018-2022). However, our portfolio of work continues to expand and highlights of new projects are included later in the report.

Director's Report

Welcome to our second combined Annual Report for the Social Policy Research Centre and Centre for Social Research in Health. The collaboration and synergies across the Centres continue to grow, with many achievements and instances of leadership and impact for both entities over the course of 2019. A few of these are highlighted below.

We welcomed new SHARP appointment Professor Deborah Lupton and her Vitalities Lab team comprising Dr Ash Watson, Dr Clare Southerton and Dr Marianne Clark. The interdisciplinary research hub is part of both Centres with the team working on understanding human experience in the context of the more-than-human worlds in which they move and live. We also welcomed the return of Dr Margaret Raven as a new Scientia Fellow with SPRC.

We farewelled Professor Peter Saunders officially in 2019, but with an event planned in early 2020 that brought together many of his collaborators, colleagues and friends together to celebrate and acknowledge his many achievements in the field of poverty and inequality in Australia. Peter remains with SPRC as Emeritus Professor. We also farwelled Professor Alex Broom, Dr Katherine Kenny and Dr Rhiannon Parker from CSRH and Dr Katinka Van De Ven from SPRC.

The role of the Centres hold a significant role in training the next generation of scholars. We celebrated the awarding of PhDs to SPRC graduates Dr Georgia van Toorn, Dr Deborah Lutz and Dr Cathy Thomson, and to CSRH graduates Dr Horas Wong, Dr Christopher Tumwine, Dr Stefanie Plage, Dr Angela Cui and Dr Naveed Noor.

The Centres remain as significant contributors in thought leadership and public debate. Through SPRC, UNSW was proud to be part of the launch of the new Poverty and Inequality website, a hub of the latest research and data from the ACOSS and UNSW Poverty & Inequality Partnership. Associate Professor Limin Mao unpacked her 20-year journey into social HIV research with gay Asian men as the headliner for our 2019 Sex Lecture, once again held in conjunction with Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras Festival.

CSRH also hosted two engaging public lectures with external speakers Professor Marsha Rosengarten and Professor Jack Halberstam and we celebrated the launch of Dr Kerryn Drysdale's book *Intimate Investments in Drag King Cultures*. Both Centres continue to hold a seminar series to share and discuss leading work from our own scholars and visitors and hosted 11 seminars each in 2019.

The main event for the year though was SPRC's Australian Social Policy Conference, held over three days in September with more than 250 participants from academia, government and the community social welfare sector in attendance. Highlights included a keynote presentation from our own Professor Alison Ritter on the policy dialogue on drug testing welfare recipients in Australia, the dedicated Chinese Social Policy stream and a closing panel discussion with ACOSS and NGOs that explored three different perspectives on poverty and inequality in Australia.

The contribution of the Centres towards making research from UNSW among the best in the world was recognised with the Faculty of Arts & Social Sciences receiving several top ratings in the 2018 Excellence in Research in Australia (ERA) analysis (published in early 2019).

Further individual recognition of our CSRH and SPRC colleagues is outlined in the scholarly achievements sections within this report and it's tremendous to see the talent of our staff being recognised in awards for scholarship, advocacy and supervision.
