Summary of the Course

Subject Area: Japanese Studies

Given the popularity of both Japanese comics or manga and anime with learners of Japanese, the course focuses on a single title (available both in manga and anime) that reflects various aspects of contemporary Japanese life such as family life, education, and work. The course provides you an opportunity to 1) extend your Japanese language vocabulary, grammar and kanji through using authentic materials, 2) improve your listening skills through watching anime, and 3) analyse the socio-cultural aspects of the anime/manga title as part of a critical literacy approach. Activities include reading the manga out loud, performance of one section from a set manga/anime narrative, and specific language learning based assignments through the title of your selection to encourage you to become an active learner of key elements in the Japanese language.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Employ linguistics skills and knowledge of functional aspects of manga and anime to read/watch them in detail in Japanese.
- 2. Communicate and debate complex aspects of socio-cultural context of manga and anime in Japanese.
- 3. Develop various oral and written communication styles in Japanese.
- 4. Undertake rigorous and engaged scholarship to direct personal learning goals.

Assessment 1: Quizzes

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: 10-15mins

Details: 2 x 15 mins. Short answer questions. Each quiz consists of questions that assess student's linguistic and pragmatic skills in Japanese communication. Feedback in the form of marks with error corrections and written comment.

Assessment 2: Manga Performance

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: 10 minutes per pair

Details: Student analyses a scene from a manga episode in terms of kanji, vocabulary, expressions and pronunciation and their usage in context, then performs one of the characters by reading out the outer/inner voices of the character. After the performance, student self-evaluates the performance. (Performance time: no more than 10 minutes per performance). The performance is most likely to be conducted in interaction with other character performed by other student(s). Feedback in the form of numerical mark and via rubric.

Assessment 3: Anime Performance

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: 10 minutes per group

Details: Student analyses a scene from an anime episode in terms of vocabulary, expressions and pronunciation and their usage in context, then performs one of the characters by voice-overing. After the performance, student self-evaluates the performance. (Performance time: no more than 10 minutes per performance). The performance is most likely to be conducted in interaction with other characters performed by other student(s). Feedback in the form of numerical mark and via rubric.

Assessment 4: Learning Project

Start date: W3

Length: 8 weeks

Details: Student identifies skill(s) s/he wishes to enhance, select own material from either manga or anime, planning own tasks using the title, put them into practice, self-evaluate the work/skill, and share the outcomes with other students. Student keeps record of all of the learning activities in a portfolio. Duration W5-10. Approximately 15 hours of work including in-class activities. Feedback in the form of numerical mark and via rubric.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.
