## **Course Details**

#### **Credit Points 6**

## **Summary of the Course**

This is an introductory course in Modern Standard Chinese language (Mandarin) for non-background speakers. The course will start with basic components of Chinese language: the *pinyin*, and characters. It will teach you how the Chinese language works both grammatically and in socio-cultural contexts so that you start to develop your linguistic and communicative competences. The four language skills - Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing - are integrated throughout the course. A cultural awareness is also built into the course. Through language study you will develop an informed understanding of Chinese linguistic behaviour, society and culture.

This course is a beginners-level language course. All students who have had some experience with the language, either as a heritage language or through previous instruction, must fill in the placement questionnaire available at https://hal.arts.unsw.edu.au/students/courses/language-placements. You will not be permitted to enrol in a language course that is too easy for you. If this occurs, you will be requested to change your enrolment.

## **Course Learning Outcomes**

- 1. Recognise, pronounce and write pinyin and characters at introductory level
- 2. Use full skills of Chinese language (listening, reading, speaking and writing) at introductory level within topics related to everyday practical situations
- 3. Identify a basic critical understanding of aspects of Chinese linguistic behaviour, society and culture.

## **Teaching Strategies**

Language is best acquired through a holistic and interactive fashion, so all four language skills - listening, speaking, reading, and writing - as well as a cultural component are integrated throughout this course. The emphasis is on the transformation of linguistic skills into active communication. Specific instructions and practices pertinent to each skill development are woven into the learning activities, aligned with the assessments, taking into account that this course is for non-background beginners. To achieve the desired effect, effort and careful planning have been made to align our teaching strategies, methods and structure with the aims and learning outcomes of the course. The lecture serves as an overall introduction to both language and cultural aspects relevant to each chapter. The tutorials focus on the integrated language skills through a variety of exercises. All the assessments, including class activities and group interactive projects, are set to engage students in active learning and effective communication. A multi-media approach and on-line assessments are also adopted to complement the communicative and grammar-translation approach to enrich each student's learning experiences.

## **Academic Honesty and Plagiarism**

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre (http://www.lc.unsw.edu.au/). Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.
