## **Summary of the Course**

Subject Area: Spanish and Latin American Studies

Spanish is the language of over four hundred million people. It is spoken officially in 23 countries and it is the second language of the United States, where there are some 45 million Spanish speakers. Spanish is also one of the four major languages of the European Union alongside English, French and German. If you are interested in learning one of the most commonly spoken first languages in the world and have no prior knowledge of the Spanish language, then Introductory Spanish A is the right course for you. Based on a communicative and culture-based approach, this course is designed to help you quickly develop your proficiency in basic oral and written Spanish. Vocabulary and basic Spanish grammar are presented in contexts that are relevant for everyday language use. You will also learn basic language learning strategies to make your learning process more effective. The course introduces you to some facets of Hispanic societies and culture and, in this way, gives you a better understanding of life in Hispanic-speaking countries and also a basic insight into the culture of the Spanish speaking world. We are the first and only university in Australia using the innovative Online Coaching program which offers you a unique opportunity to work outside of class with a personal, native-speaker language coach located in a Spanish Speaking country in a real-time, online learning environment. We hope that this unique personal experience will be truly enjoyable and will motivate you to continue learning Spanish.

This course is a beginners-level language course. All students who have had some experience with the language, either as a heritage language or through previous instruction, must fill in the placement questionnaire available at https://hal.arts.unsw.edu.au/students/courses/language-placements. You will not be permitted to enrol in a language course that is too easy for you. If this occurs, you will be requested to change your enrolment.

#### At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to

- 1. Use a very basic range of vocabulary and phrases in Spanish and apply a few simple rules of grammar.
- 2. Understand and use the Spanish language in short interactions in familiar everyday situations.
- 3. Use basic strategies to maintain communication.
- 4. Identify some features of linguistic and cultural diversity, including the varied nature of the Hispanic world.

#### **Teaching Strategies**

This course is designed for students who have no previous knowledge of the language. The course seeks to create an inclusive environment where students have opportunities to explore the target language. This course introduces students to online resources and the *Dicho y hecho* website from which they can explore Spanish language and culture, and from which they receive constructive and continuous feedback. The materials selected for this course provide a diversity of activities to assist students with different learning needs and linguistic capabilities.

This is a "blended learning" course which contains a large out of class learning component, namely your weekly on-line live coaching sessions with tutors in a Spanish speaking country and

your weekly activities on the *Dicho y hecho Student Companion Site*. See Moodle for details. In addition to this we will be using a range of other teaching modalities, including in-class small and large group discussions, and task-oriented activities in pairs and groups. In your lectures, tutorials and live coaching you will be engaging in:

- · Speaking activities
- Grammar activities
- · Writing activities
- Reading comprehension activities related to the themes studied
- · Audio-visual comprehension activities

## **Assessment**

As stated in the Course Overview, students in this course are expected to attend all classes and complete all activities. Attendance will be taken by the instructor at each lecture and/or tutorial, and records will be kept by the convenor. **Students who fail to attend at least 80% of** lectures and/or tutorials may be refused final assessment. The final assessment for attendance purposes is identified in the "Assessment" section of the Course Overview.

#### **Assessment Details**

**Assessment 1: 3 Tests** 

**Start date:** Not Applicable

Length: 50 minutes

**Details:** Comprehensive assessments which are based on all aspects of Spanish studied in the course. The format used in these tests is: a grammatical on-line component /Quiz(""fill in the blanks"" and "multiple choice") and a short 80-100 word composition in Spanish on topics practiced in the class. Individual feedback and rubric. Tests 1 and 2 count for 20% each. Test 3 (25%) is the final assessment for attendance purposes.

#### **Additional details:**

3 Tests in class tests during your tutorial time. Test 1 in week 5 ,Test 2 in week 10, and Test 3 (final test) in two parts: written part in week 12 (Tut) Grammar Quiz in week 13 - (Tut-lab)

This is a comprehensive assessment which is based on all aspects of Spanish studied in the lectures, tutorials and on-line coaching. Each test consists of the following 5 segments: Así es dice (vocabulary), Así se forma (grammar), Para escuchar (Listening comprehension), Para escribir (writing), and Cultura. To prepare for these tests complete Self-tests , as well as Quizzes you will find on Moodle under relevant week. Self-tests and Quizzes prepare you for your Test and give you an immediate feedback on your Spanish skills.

The format used in these tests is: a grammatical on-line component /Quiz("fill in the blanks" and "multiple choice"). Para escribir component (a short 80-100 word composition in Spanish on topics practiced in the class). Done in the Language laboratory, see Moodle for details.

Assessment 2: On-line live coaching sessions

Length: 30 min per week/8 compulsory sessions

**Details:** Oral component (30 min per week/8 compulsory sessions). Your mark will reflect your preparedness for the class and active participation in a range of activities. The convenor marks your work based on the recordings of your sessions and weekly reports from coaches. Feedback: individual and marks

#### Additional details:

Online coaching sessions start in week 3 and finish in week 12. You will have a total of 10 sessions of which you will need to complete 8 sessions minimum to pass this component.

Your mark will reflect your regular attendance, preparedness for the class, and active participation in a range of activities. **Coaches do not mark your oral performance**. The convenor marks your work based on the recordings of your sessions and weekly reports from coaches. SeeOn-Line caoching PPT on Moodle for further information.

**Assessment 3: Oral Test**

Length: 3 minutes oral interaction.

**Details:** A short oral test comprising a 3 minute conversation with your tutor on topics covered this session. This test will be recorded. Feedback via marks only.

#### **Late Assessment Penalties**

An assessed task is deemed late if it is submitted after the specified time and date as set out in the course Learning Management System (LMS).

The late penalty is the loss of 5% of the total possible marks for the task for each day or part thereof the work is late. Lateness will include weekends and public holidays. This does not apply to a task that is assessed but no mark is awarded.

Work submitted fourteen (14) days after the due date will be marked and feedback provided but no mark will be recorded. If the work would have received a pass mark but for the lateness and the work is a compulsory course component, a student will be deemed to have met that requirement. This does not apply to a task that is assessed but no mark is awarded.

Work submitted twenty-one (21) days after the due date will not be accepted for marking or feedback and will receive no mark or grade. If the assessment task is a compulsory component of the course a student will automatically fail the course.

## **Academic Honesty and Plagiarism**

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit. It also applies to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without referencing and a student's own analysis to bring the material together.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.
