Attendance Requirements

Summary of the Course

Subject Area: Spanish and Latin American Studies

This course provides advanced level instruction in Spanish language study from a communicative and task-based approach. You will develop your listening and speaking skills through a number of different activities, as well as your reading and writing skills in Spanish. Vocabulary and grammatical structures are presented in the context of culturally relevant issues. Audio-visual web based material is used as an introduction to vocabulary, grammar structures and culturally relevant topics. Topics may include intercultural communication, current events and issues in the Spanish-speaking world. The medium of instruction is Spanish.

At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to

- 1. Examine oral and written texts in a variety of media dealing with contemporary problems that are relevant to the Hispanic world.
- 2. Debate on prepared subjects with a degree of fluency and spontaneity in Spanish.
- 3. Produce clear, detailed written and spoken discussions on a wide range of subjects using effective grammatical devices and appropriate vocabulary.
- 4. Use suitable learning strategies to continually enhance and expand acquired skills.

Teaching Strategies

This course is designed for students who have finished Intermediate Spanish B. The course seeks to create an inclusive environment where students have opportunities to explore the target language at their own pace, following their own interests. It includes interesting, inter-cultural real-life learning experiences, which are a key for life-long learning. Experiences of active and dialectic learning to develop critical thinking are also included in the curriculum. The language materials used for this course are real texts, audios or films based upon the belief that foreign language learning materials are the road to practice the language and the trip along this road will be enhanced if the materials are engaging, contextualized and relevant to the students' interests whether personal or professional. The materials selected for this course provides a diversity of activities to assist students with different learning needs.

The teaching in this course is blended: online and in class activities. Lectures and tutorials are based on a flipped-classroom philosophy. The flipped lectures describe a reversal of traditional teaching where students gain first exposure to new material outside of class, via reading, videos, podcasts or other online activities, and then class time is used to practice, communicate and work. This approach requires you to come prepared to the lectures and tutorials and to actively engage with the different activities and tasks during the face to face time.

Assessment 1: Audiovisual activities

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: varies

Details: Pre class audio-visual activities (self access) to be completed weekly. Length and tasks vary (quizzes, forums, reading comprehension, audios, videos.) Between 10 and 20 minutes to complete in your own time developing listening skills, writing or reading. Feedback online, individual comments, and in-class discussion.

25% to complete 5 audio visual quizzes, 5% to complete and submit the Pre-class activities.

Audiovisual activities

This assessment is based upon listening comprehension from audiovisual material within Moodle. Students, during the week indicated in the program and at their own time, will complete 5 audio - visual quizzes (from the movie "El Laberinto del Fauno" and "Como agua para chocolate". **No late submissions will be allowed.**

Pre lecture activities (5%)

Every week you will find a short online activity to complete **before the lecture**, this activities will vary from week to week, could be a mini quiz, a forum, an oral forum, a short reading comprehension etc. (Self access)

Assessment 2: Grammar Quiz

Details: Grammar assessment in 2 parts (20-30 minutes)This assessment is based upon revising grammar aspects of Spanish and is done via online in-class grammar quizzes. Feedback online

In class assessment, students under no circumstances are allowed to take the test outside of the language laboratories and without tutor's supervision

This assessment is based on grammar aspects, vocabulary, expressions, etc. learned during lectures and is done via 2 **online in-class grammar, vocabulary**, **reading comprehension quizzes**. The quizzes will have time constraints. Before doing each quiz, it is recommended to make use of the extensive set of weekly grammar practice exercises and activities provided in Moodle (Lecture section)

Assessment 3: Oral

Start date: Not Applicable

Length: 6 x 30 min. online coaching

Details: Online coaching 30 minutes per 6 sessions. Students will speak, debate and interact in Spanish. Oral interaction will be recorded and graded according to: quality of spoken Spanish and use of appropriate discourse. Feedback individual comments and rubric

Assessment 4: Reading/Writing

Length: 400 words

Details: This is the final assessment for attendance purposes. A reading comprehension and writing.(400 words)Feedback: mark only

Additional details:

In week 13 your lecturer will conduct an assessment of your reading and writing abilities in Spanish. This assessment will contain two parts; one a reading comprehension set of questions and part two a writing activity. The content of both sections will reflect the content learned during the semester.

Submission of Assessment Tasks

Students are expected to put their names and student numbers on every page of their assignments.

Generally, assessment tasks must be submitted electronically via either Turnitin or a Moodle assignment. In instances where this is not possible, it will be stated on your course's Moodle site with alternative submission details.

Late Assessment Penalties

An assessed task is deemed late if it is submitted after the specified time and date as set out in the course Learning Management System (LMS).

The late penalty is the loss of 5% of the total possible marks for the task for each day or part thereof the work is late. Lateness will include weekends and public holidays. This does not apply to a task that is assessed but no mark is awarded.

Work submitted fourteen (14) days after the due date will be marked and feedback provided but no mark will be recorded. If the work would have received a pass mark but for the lateness and the work is a compulsory course component, a student will be deemed to have met that requirement. This does not apply to a task that is assessed but no mark is awarded.

Work submitted twenty-one (21) days after the due date will not be accepted for marking or feedback and will receive no mark or grade. If the assessment task is a compulsory component of the course a student will automatically fail the course.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit. It also applies to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without referencing and a student's own analysis to bring the material together.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre (http://www.lc.unsw.edu.au/). Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.
