Course Description

This course provides the continuation of training in psychological assessment, treatment skills

and ethical practices as required in the professional context. This course is associated with the Orientation Placement at the UNSW Forensic Psychology Clinic (satisfactory progress on Orientation Placement required). The course is presented through workshops.

The focus of this course is to help students develop the professional skills and ethical decision making required for the practice of Forensic Psychology. This course is offered through workshops that apply directly to placement competency development.

Placements

Hurdle task - Satisfactory progress on Orientation Placement is required for course completion. A mid-placement evaluation of the Orientation Placement will take place with you and the clinic team and form the basis of the evaluation of the progress on the placement, based on data provided by the clinic staff, including the task checklist, documentation tracker and the Competency Review Form. You will be provided one of three outcomes: satisfactory progression, concerns regarding progression (action plan required), or recommendation to discontinue the

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placement. If you are recommended to discontinue the program, you will maintain the choice to continue with an action plan (unless there has been a breach of professional and/or ethical conduct), and it is recommended you meet with the Program Director to discuss ramifications of the raised concerns. If you have the outcome for the recommendation of an action plan (the latter two outcomes), then the course mark will be held until successful completion of PSYC7419 (PEP3) placement.

Submission of Assessment Tasks

Penalty for Late Submissions

UNSW has a standard late submission penalty of:

- 5% per day,
- for all assessments where a penalty applies,
- capped at five days (120 hours) from the assessment deadline, after which a student cannot submit an assessment, and
- no permitted variation.

Any variations to the above will be explicitly stated in the Course Outline for a given course or assessment task.

Students are expected to manage their time to meet deadlines and to request extensions as early as possible before the deadline.

Special Consideration

If circumstances prevent you from attending/completing an assessment task, you must officially apply for special consideration, usually within 3 days of the sitting date/due date.
